Cow-Bop a tasty mixture of old and new

Westridge proves a fine venue, sparked by Bruce Forman's humor and a tribute to Shep Shepherd.

For the first time in all the years FOJ has held an annual Western Jazz Barbecue and featured the music of the Bruce Forman Country-Western Band, the event was held at the Westridge Golf Club in La Habra – and the location wasn't the only thing that was new.

As in previous years, things started at 5 p.m. with a nohost cocktail hour, and the barbecue buffet was served at 6. Throughout, attendees got a stream of live music from Forman and his three talented musicians plus vocalist Pinto Pammy. Casually known as "Cow-Bop," the quintet has been called "the best in cow-boy jazz," praise more than borne out throughout the Friends of Jazz event.



Among the "new" was the fact that the evening was Colleen Wadsworth's first Cow-Bop as FOJ's president, and she took the mic to thank everyone involved, noting that

"for more than 15 years, Friends of Jazz has generated nearly a million dollars" that it has pumped back into the local educational systems (grade school, high school and college).

Jennifer Hart took the opportunity to announce Shep Shepherd's upcoming CD release party, held at Saddleback College (in mid-July). The CD, she noted, is the youthful 99-year-old legend's vocal debut album.

As if on cue, Shep joined the band, providing vocal renditions of "You Make Me Feel So Young," popularized by Frank Sinatra, and "When You're Smiling," a number associated with Satchmo.

Bruce Forman asked the crowd whether the entertainment aspect of the barbecue was "dance or show?" Wife Pinto Pammy urged FOJers toward "dance" by singing "Walkin' After Midnight" while leading everyone in a line dance. That prompted

Bruce to call the event "a dance – but one where we put on a show at the same time." Familiar from past Cow-Bop events was the inclusion of numbers like "Mambo Italiano," "Route 66," "Crazy," and "Cow-Cow Boogie" - but we also got more that was new: The band announced that it was Shep's birthday, and when Pinto Pammy was informed that his birthday was several months earlier (in January), she said "We're gonna do it anyway, because you're so special." That led to a spirited chorus of the birthday song, followed by the Willie Nelson song "Don't Be Ashamed Of Your Age."

Though Bruce's wry and dry sense of humor s always on display during his FOJ appearances, this time around he was even more jocular – first with his comedic song "Benny's From Heaven," meant to get the audience on its feet and onto the dance floor, next with his self-referential song "Ten-Dollar Baby," a jokey reference to his musical work on pal Clint Eastwood's 2004 hit film "Million Dollar Baby."

Yet another great humorous original was Bruce's song "The Tinder App," a hilarious number with Forman lyrics about millennials using the dating app to "hook up," all set to the tune of "The Tender Trap." If anyone else in the music world has the same skill as Bruce in connecting to both those of average FOJ age and the ages of their grandkids, we have yet to see it.

The charmed musical life of Jeremy Siskind

In the 12 years since he was awarded an FOJ scholarship, pianist and Orange County native Jeremy Siskind has been on an incredible journey. That journey has situated him in the heart of the jazz world, New York City, first as a student, then as a participant in numerous piano competitions, and as a performer, recording artist, educator and author.

Siskind's talents were evident for many of those in Friends of Jazz who first met him in 2004 and heard him play: He deservedly was awarded an FOJ scholarship that year at a ceremony at Steamers Jazz Club & Café in Fullerton. In fact, his parents still actively support FOJ, having donated \$1,000 this past spring.

The Irvine native started playing piano at the age of four. While in high school, he became interested in jazz and began studying with pianists Linda Martinez and Tamir Hendelman in the Los Angeles area. Soon, he enrolled in and attended the prestigious Eastman School of Music in Rochester, NY, where he studied piano with Tony Caramia and Harold Danko.

Realizing that New York City was the place to be, Siskind moved there and began working on a masters degree in English Literature at Columbia. He also began performing as a freelance artist, became a student of jazz legend Fred Hersch, and earned recognition in several of the world's most important jazz competitions – the Nottingham International Solo Piano Competition, in which he won 1st prize, the Montreux Jazz Festival Solo Piano Competition, in which he took 2nd prize, and the American Pianist Association's Cole Porter Fellowship, in which he was a two-time finalist.

Siskind made his debut at Carnegie Hall in 2012, performing classical music in the concert's first half and jazz in the second. Since then, he has been a full-time Professor of Piano at Western Michigan University in Kalamazoo, and in 2014 he became Chair of the Keyboard Area.

In addition to his teaching duties, Siskind has published four books with Hal Leonard, including solo etudes, duets for two pianists, and a new instructional book, "The Jazz Band Pianist." He has also been busy recording. "Housewarming," his latest album, features Grammy-winner Kurt Elling. A review in *DownBeat* magazine praised the recording as "a shining example" of the chamber jazz genre and awarded it a four-star rating.



Siskind has traveled to China, Nepal, Thailand, Japan, Switzerland, Tunisia, France, and England as a performer and teacher of jazz piano, frequently with the non-profit organization Jazz Education Abroad, which aims to bring knowledge about and education of jazz to students who may not have ready access to the music. At a special benefit concert held in Irvine in 2015, he raised \$2,700 for the Kathmandu Jazz Conservatory in Nepal.

Besides these professional ventures, Siskind has become a trailblazer for the house concert movement. His trio has performed roughly 80 in-home concerts in 25 different states, and he gave a presentation called "The Art of the In-Home Concert" at the Jazz Education Network convention held in San Diego in January, 2015.
