About 100 guests had plenty to celebrate at this year's Mardi Gras Ball, held March 19 at the Velvet Rose in Orange. And it was all for a good cause: keeping music in the schools since 1999.

And boy did they celebrate! Plenty of dancing, parading, eating, drinking, bidding on auction items and just plain merriment.

At 5pm, doors opened for cocktail hour, and guests were greeted by the CSUF Titan Ramblers (Bill Cunliffe, director). They were served delicious hors-d'oeuvres, given a drink ticket, beads, a colorful mask, and a ticket for a free photo while the band entertained. They also got their first look at the array of 75 silent auction items beautifully displayed in numerous baskets, and they bought tickets for a 50/50 drawing and the wine

wheel (which included a chance for dinner at the Summit House).

Dressed in their finest clothes, masks and costumes, guests joyfully joined in

the krewe parade led by FOJ's dragon and Fullerton College's Lemon Street Stompers (led by Director Bruce Babad on sax) throughout the venue, dancing and waving beautifully decorated parasols, while the krewe played "When the Saints Go Marching In."

In the ballroom, the CSU Fullerton Jazz Orchestra, directed by Bill Cunliffe, provided some great entertainment for listening and dancing. Of course, what ball would not be complete without the 2022 king and queen, Nick and Dottie Batinich, whose reign began at the 2020 Mardi Gras ball. Then FOJ President Colleen introduced the **new royal couple for 2023: Bob and Doris Muschek.**

While at dinner, guests were treated to the vocal jazz group, Fullerton College's own J-Train. Later on, their director, Jamie Shew, sang several crowd-pleasing jazz standards with the CSU Fullerton Jazz Orchestra, along with local crooner Gavin Braun and surprise vocalist Mark Miller. And lots of dancers were swinging and swaying to the

The festival features jam-packed days filled with school performances, outdoor concerts, awards ceremonies, and master classes by stellar clinicians. Their premiere, award-winning jazz ensembles will be performing at the featured noon concerts in the Campus Theatre: J-Train on Friday and The Fullerton College Big Band on Saturday. Each day's event will conclude with a concert featuring the college's Faculty Jazz Cadre, featuring Jamie Shew (vocal), Bruce Babad (saxophones and flute), Jeremy

Siskind (piano), Mike Scott (guitar), Lyman Medeiros (bass), and Matt Johnson (drums). If you go, consider staying for the entire day to support the many performers and take part in the many opportunities this festival offers.

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Grammy Award-Winner Bill Cunliffe's World Orchestral Premiere is featured at Lincoln Center this month



Temple University Jazz Band will perform a one-night only classical-jazz concert April 16 at Lincoln Center. The band will be joined onstage by its sister groups as well as its Faculty Sextet. The program includes the world premiere of *Rainforests* by Bill Cunliffe, as well as the New York premiere of Billy Childs's *Labyrinth*.

According to Terell Stafford, Director of Jazz Studies and Chair of Instrumental Studies at Temple University, this concert is a milestone in Temple University's history. "For the first time ever, two of Temple's top instrumental groups as well as jazz faculty members will be performing on one stage in New York City. This is a great way to hear the future of classical and jazz music which rest assured is in good hands!"

The evening's cornerstones are two commissioned works for TU's Studio Orchestra by Grammy Awardwinning artists. Pianist/composer Bill Cunliffe celebrates one of the world's most important and special places, Rainforests. This large swinging piece is peppered with Latin rhythms, consistent with Cunliffe's acclaimed compositional style. *Rainforests* is the latest collaboration in a

decade-long friendship between the composer and Temple University. In 2012, his Overture, Waltz and Rondo was released on Temple's label, BCM+D Records, featuring Stafford and the TUSO. It awarded Cunliffe a Grammy nomination for Best Instrumental Composition.

The world premiere of Bill Cunliffe's *Rainforests* will be performed by the Temple University Studio Orchestra, with Terell Stafford, trumpet; Dick Oatts, saxophone; Bruce Barth, piano; Tim Warfield, saxophone; and Jose Luis Dominguez, conductor.

Cal State Fullerton Professor of Music Bill Cunliffe is a jazz pianist, composer, Grammy Award-winning arranger and record producer. He is known for his work in blending jazz with the classical and pop genres based on a deep knowledge of and a lively curiosity about musical styles. As a solo artist and bandleader, he has more than a dozen albums to his name, and wearing other hats, including as a sideman, he appears on numerous other recordings.

In addition to teaching full time at Cal State Fullerton's School of Music, Cunliffe is a longtime faculty member of the Skidmore Jazz Institute and the Vail Jazz Workshop.
